Herb Norton

After 23 years of being active in SGEU, Herb Norton was awarded a life membership at this year's convention.

Norton remembers the first union meeting he went to.

"I didn't want to go," he says, "but a couple of guys talked me into it. They started nominations toward the end of the meeting, and they kept nominating me for positions, and I kept declining."

But when a position to represent Local 1122 on Provincial Council came up, Norton agreed to take it on.

"Ever since, I've been the Provincial Council rep for the local," he says, aside from the last couple of years.

Last July, Norton retired from his job as a Corrections Officer at the Buffalo Narrows Community Correctional Centre, after the provincial government shut it down.

Norton says the closure of the centre was hard on a lot of people, especially on the younger employees.

"I was disappointed," he says. "It was sad to see it happen."

Norton says it's important to be involved in the union to ensure that workers have good wages and benefits.

"A pension plan is a great thing," he adds. "Now that I've reached retirement – because of the union and the pension plan – I can enjoy it. I know a lot of people my age who don't have a pension plan."

Norton says he feels honoured to be recognized as a life member of SGEU.

"It means a lot," he says. "I really, really appreciate the people I work with in the elected part of the union. They're really great to me."
