# Supporting people with PTSI

Even though awareness of Post Traumatic Stress Injury (PTSI) has improved in recent years, today's keynote speaker Julius Brown, and his team at the OSI-CAN Support Initiative are on a mission to continue raising awareness on the issue.

As the director for the initiative, based in Regina, Julius brings a unique perspective to PTSI and Occupational Stress Injury. Having served in the U.S. Armed Forces, with family members who have also served, Julius has seen first hand the effects that PTSI can have on people and is committed to helping others.

"It's a subject that I know a lot about, and I'm very happy to be part of the positive change that is taking place. There is still a stigma attached to it due to the lack of education, but we have gained a lot of traction because now it's being talked about," said Julius.

Julius and his team also offer meaningful support to people suffering from PTSI and help them access resources.

"There can be lots of confusion out there on who to contact for support or help, so we help people navigate the help that is needed, and then route them toward the proper service providers," he said.

# The changing face of the union

Darla Deguire, Prairie Regional Director for the Canadian Labour Congress, will speak about the changing face of the union at tonight's Human Rights/Equity Caucus. A member of Beardy's First Nation in Saskatchewan, Darla is a former Aboriginal Vice-President for the Saskatchewan Federation of Labour, and an experienced facilitator and educator. She co-authored the lauded Unionism on Turtle Island, an intensive workshop dedicated to Aboriginal culture, history, and awareness of indigenous



issues. She is a passionate advocate for a representative workforce, and has engaged Saskatchewan governments, of all levels, in ensuring that a community's workforce resembles its people.

At the Human Rights/Equity Caucus, you will also have an opportunity to discuss resolutions that are relevant to the Caucus, hear from SGEU President Bob Bymoen, participate in a roundtable, and fill out a survey that asks members who belong to an equity group to identify any challenges they face in the workplace.

The Caucus will take place at 5:30 p.m. in the Pine Room.
