Rally to restore and rebuild

Convention delegates rallied outside the Saskatoon Cabinet Office, calling on the government to restore and rebuild public services.

"The Sask Party government's hold-theline 2018 budget does not begin to undo the harm that its 2017 budget inflicted on Saskatchewan families and communities," said SGEU President Bob Bymoen.



Many were hoping this year's budget would mean a new direction for Saskatchewan.

SGEU's 2018-19 budget

The Admin Committee brought forward a balanced budget to the floor of convention. After delegates discussed the importance of prioritizing education and training for new members, an amendment passed that allocated \$150,000 to these initiatives. The amendment did put the budget into deficit, but savings will be realized throughout the fiscal year to achieve balance.



New Life Members

In December 1989, Donna Christianson took a job as a part-time Customer Service representative at the public liquor store in Watson and became a member of SGEU.

"A friend asked me to get involved in the union, and we'd go to meetings together," she recalls. "And that's how it started. I think I just jumped right into the position of Chief Steward because there wasn't one in my area." (... continue reading)
